## QUICK FACTS

### THE WAR ON DRUGS...

- More than \$50 billion is spent every year waging the failed "War on Drugs."
- 55% of inmates in federal prison are incarcerated for drug offenses.
- The United States has 5% of the world's population. but houses 25% of the world's prisoners.
- While African Americans comprise nearly 13% of the population, and proportionately account for 13% of drug users, they make up 37% of those arrested, 53% of those convicted, and 67% of those sent to jail for drug offenses.
- More than 46% of Americans have admitted to using an illicit drug at least once.

#### ...IS A WAR ON STUDENTS

- Between 1999 and 2003, drug arrests on college campuses increased by more than 25%, even though illicit drug use rates among college students remained relatively constant.
- Since 1998, hundreds of thousands of students have been denied college financial aid just because they have drug convictions. This aid elimination penalty, part of the Higher Education Act, does not apply to even the most violent criminals such as murderers and rapists.
- The federal government has wasted more than \$1.5 billion on dishonest and harmful "anti-drug" propaganda. Congress continues to support the National Youth Anti-Drug Media Campaign even though federally-funded research shows that the ads actually cause more teen drug use.
- In 2006, Congress flushed nearly \$10.4 million down the toilet on random student drug testing. even though federally-funded research found testing to be ineffective at deterring teen drug use.
- It costs more than four times as much to imprison a person for a year than to pay for one year of tuition at a public university.

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
